Welcome to The Family Center

The Family Center is the early childhood education and family resource component for the School District of Clayton. We opened our doors in 1975 out of a commitment to support the growth, development and well being of parents and children in our community. We know that healthy families support children's academic success in school and life and make for a strong community. This public school program model of parent and early childhood education has inspired many similar programs in the St. Louis area and throughout the country. Here are the programs you will find at the Family Center:

- Parenting Education: We offer workshops for parents of kids 0-18 years on a range of topics from toddler tantrums all the way to the tricky teen years. In connection with our extensive parenting library, we read and discuss topics of interest that help support your important role as a parent.
- **Parent Coaching:** We offer short-term parent coaching for families who feel 'stuck' in a difficult spot and could use a neutral, compassionate ear and some new parenting strategies.
- Parents as Teachers: This is a free program for parents of children prenatal through kindergarten
 entry. A parent educator will visit with you either in your home or at the center to discuss parenting
 questions or concerns you may have, offer community resources and share developmental information to prepare you for upcoming developmental milestones. PAT also offers an annual development
 screening.
- Stay, Play & Learn: This playtime for parents, caregivers and children ages birth-5 meets in our open and airy playroom full of places to climb, draw, pretend, paint, read, build with blocks, make new friends and more!
- Early Childhood Education: The Family Center has a full early childhhood program for children 15 months through kindergarten entry. For more information and full class listings, see our website listed at the bottom of this page.
- Early Childhood Special Education: The School District of Clayton provides free and appropriate education to children identified as eligible according to the Missouri state education plan. Parents of children 3-5 years old or approaching 3, who suspect their child may have a developmental delay that may affect them educationally, should contact their PAT parent educator. Families not participating in PAT should contact the Family Center.

Parenting Workshops

For Parents of Children Birth-18 years

Parenting workshops at the Family Center offer you a dedicated time to explore new ideas and tools for parenting and discuss questions and concerns within a safe and supportive learning community. Our focus is not on being perfect parents, but being parents who are intentional about growing in our understanding of ourselves, our kids, and integrating new strategies that help our families thrive.

Q. How are the workshops structured?

Our workshops are small, usually 6-12 people. We meet in the parenting library of the Family Center for an 1 1/2 hour discussion, often based on something everyone has read, on a particular topic of interest related to parenting and family life.

Q. Who can attend the workshops?

All are welcome. Workshops are open to all residents of Clayton and the St. Louis community. Parents from Chesterfield, O'Fallon, University City, Ladue, Kirkwood and Webster have attended our workshops. See specific class descriptions for resident and non-resident fees.

Q. Why take a parenting workshop?

You are considered a resident if:

You live in, or own residential property in the school district of Clayton, have a child in Clayton's K-12 school program (including voluntary transfer program), or your child's grandparents live in the school district of Clayton. (for workshops and Stay, Play & Learn only)

Childcare:

Childcare is available for morning workshops with a minimum of 3 children. Children are typically supervised in the same room by an Early Childhood Educator.

Volunteer!

Volunteers are an integral part of the Family Center program. There are several ways for you to become actively involved, and you are always welcome to bring your own child. For more information or to participate in the following areas, contact JoAnn Dunn (314) 854-6900. Volunteers assist the early child-hood educators during parenting workshops. When you volunteer, you are asked to commit to the full duration of the class, which may range from 3 to 7 sessions. Substitute volunteers take the place of a regular volunteer who is unable to assist in a class on a given day. You will earn hour-for-hour tuition credit toward a class or Center membership.

Financial Assistance:

We strive to make workshops and parent-child activities available to all interested families. If you are in need of financial assistance to meet the cost of any of our programs, these options are available.

- In-kind payment: volunteer hours are credited for fees for parenting workshops and Stay, Play and Learn.
- PTO Scholarship grants for residents only; requests for grants are to be addressed to the Family Center Director, Debbie Reilly.
- Any other fee reduction to be arranged with the Director.

Parents as Teachers

For Parents of Children Prenatal-Kindergarten Entry

Because you are your child's first and most important teacher.

The concept for Parents as Teachers (PAT) was pioneered in Missouri in 1981 to help parents embrace their important role as their child's first and best teacher. Today, PAT is an international organization equipping parent educators with information and tools to support today's families. Clayton School District believes that investing in quality early childhood and parenting education is foundational to the success of our children, families and community. PAT is offered **free** to Clayton residents **and** families with children enrolled in our early childhood classrooms.

Parents as Teachers is designed to:

Support you as you strive to be the best parent you can be Enhance your knowledge of child development and parenting practices Increase early detection of developmental delays and health issues Promote safe and healthy relationships with your child and your family Help you learn about community resources Provide specific family-oriented activities and lectures Improve kindergarten readiness and school success

Here's some of what you can expect at a PAT visit:

Your parent educator will discuss with you any observations, questions or concerns you have about parenting or your child's development.

You will receive researched-based, development information, including brain development and ideas for things you can be doing at home with your child to promote their healthy development.

Through age appropriate activities, you and your parent educator will observe your child with an eye toward how your child is learning through play.

PAT also provides a free, annual development screening. If a delay is noted, your parent educator will refer you to the appropriate agency for early intervention.

Children under the age of 3 will be screened with your parent educator on a personal visit. Children 3-5 will be screened at the Family Center on select weekends. See the dates below.

Stay, Play & Learn is a wonderful gathering place for adults, and a fun, educational place for young children to explore. Children use big muscles to climb and slide on the climber, learn about spatial relationships as they build tall block towers or have fun creating masterpieces with paint or clay in the art studio. Imaginations are engaged in the play kitchen where a child can 'cook' dinner for mom or play dress up with grandpa. Social skills are enhanced as children practice taking turns with a favorite toy or the rocking horse. Digging in the sand table with a friend is all kinds of fun for the senses. For a little slower pace, our library provides a quiet corner to read one of our many wonderful children's books. The perfect book on bedtime routines, temper tantrums or fun, family meals can be found there too, along with a wide variety of other helpful titles for parents. In addition to all this great learning, Stay, Play and Learn is a place to meet and make new friends. They might be from your own neighborhood or from anywhere in the big wide world. You will hear Russian, Mandarin, Spanish, French or many other languages given the rich ethnic diversity of our community.

Friendly staff and parent educators, are on hand to help you feel welcome, introduce you to new friends, suggest a great parenting book or discuss any parenting questions you might have. Parents and caregivers supervise their own children. Each play sessions ends with clean up and special Family Center songs.
