CHS Print Resources/Catalog Searches

Catalog: http://www.clayton.k12.mo.us/chs/library

Click "CHS Library Catalog."

LOG-IN top right-hand corner with student ID and password (same log-in you use for Chromebooks)

Type in your reformer's name (ex: Tarbell, Ida). A listing of available books will come up. Click on title of book to see where it's located and if it's checked in. Also, under databases, click on WebPath Express for reliable websites on your reformer.

Research Tip: Did you find a great reference article? Or a book that provided excellent information? Check at the end of that article or book for a listing of "**FURTHER READINGS**" or the **BIBLIOGRAPHY**. This is an excellent way to attain more information and sources for your research.

CHS Databases

To access CHS databases, go to the CHS Library website:

http://www.clayton.k12.mo.us/chs/library, click on database link on left menu.

SEARCH: Encyclopedia Britannica or WorldBook Online: these will provide encyclopedia articles on your reformer. TIP: These encyclopedia databases may also provide websites and links to additional information and articles. However, encyclopedia articles can NOT be counted as one of your sources on your bibliography. The linked articles may count.

SEARCH: U.S. and World History in Context (primary and secondary sources)

African-American Experience (specifically for AA reformers)

Annals of American History (all primary sources)

Salem Press History (biographical)

JSTOR (scholarly secondary and primary sources)

These WILL count as a source for your bibliography as long as they are not an encyclopedia article. The Salem Press articles will count as they are a specialized reference book.
