On Tuesday, May 25, the Mayor's Youth Advisory Council (MYAC) held their final meeting in which members presented their "Humans of Clayton" project documenting the pandemic experience in Clayton. This project contained interviews, a survey, a video and a time capsule. In the video, MYAC members interviewed Clayton community leaders about ways they stepped up to serve

their community during the pandemic. A public survey was distributed to find out how the pandemic affected individuals in Clayton. Nutritional Notes

From Chartwells Director of Dining Services Michelle Fohey.



As dining out at restaurants increases, so does our calorie consumption. Here are some tips while eating out to help save on calories and still enjoy our favorites.

- Always ask for dressing on the side, this can save 100-200 calories by monitoring how much dressing is put on salads.
- If possible ask for your vegetables steamed with no oil or butter to save calories from fat.
- Drink lots of water before arriving to help decrease impulse to fill up on bread or appetizers.
- When possible, share an entree, many times entrees are big enough for two.
- When your food arrives to the table, go ahead and ask for a to go box, cut your dish in half and put the rest in the box to enjoy later.
- Check out the appetizers or small plates. These are great for portion control and allow you to try more things on the menu.

Focus On: Juneteenth

Juneteenth (short for "June Nineteenth") marks the day when federal troops arrived in Galveston, Texas in 1865 to take control of the state and ensure that all enslaved people were freed. It is commemorated on the anniversary date of the June 19, 1865, announcement of General Order No. 3 by Union Army general Gordon Granger. The troops' arrival came a full two and a half years after the signing of the Emancipation Proclamation. Enforcement of the Proclamation generally relied on the advance of Union troops. Texas, as the most remote of the slave states, had a low presence of Union troops as the American Civil War ended; thus enforcement there had been slow and inconsistent before Granger's announcement. Juneteenth honors the end to slavery in the United States and is considered the longest-running African American holiday. Although Juneteenth generally celebrates the end of slavery in the United States, it was still legal and practiced in two Union border states (Delaware and Kentucky) until later that year, when ratification of the Thirteenth Amendment to the Constitution abolished chattel slavery nationwide in December. Additionally, Indian Territories that had sided with the Confederacy, namely the Choctaw, did not release those enslaved until 1866. For more information on Juneteenth, CLICK HERE.
