# From the Principal



#### From The Principal

The recent security-related events of the past two weeks can be unsettling for students, staff and families, and they are a constant reminder of the importance of our collective responsibility for our security at CHS. One takeaway from these events has been the clear importance of students speaking up when they see something concerning. In each case, students immediately found an adult in the building and they reported what they saw, which allowed the adults in the building to address the situation promptly. This has been a key tenet in all of my communications with students and staff. Thank you for all you do to help us instill this responsibility in our students.

Strong positive relationships form the basis of everything that we do in education. With this in mind we began asking students to identify trusted adults that they would feel comfortable going to if they had a problem or issue and they needed assistance. We began tracking this information over 10 years ago (when I became principal of CHS) by simply asking students to identify their trusted adults and logging this information in a spreadsheet. Likewise, we ask faculty to identify students with whom they feel they have strong, positive relationships. We took a break from this activity during COVID but continued to ask related questions in the Panorama survey, which is administered twice a year. We revived the activity earlier this year, and while the logistics of getting a complete data set took a little more time than we anticipated, we were able to create a complete list of trusted adults for each student (if they identified any). This information has allowed us to help students by leveraging their relationships with trusted adults in the building, and it has allowed us to focus extra attention on students who do not identify any adults in the building.

It is interesting to note that the positive response rate is much higher when students are asked to identify specific individuals whom they trust compared with the more general (yes/no) Panorama questions. We share these data with our staff in multiple ways. First, teachers receive a list of students who identified them as their trusted adult. Second, we share the list of students who did not identify a trusted adult at CHS with all faculty members so that we can make extra efforts at

promoting positive relationships with those students. We are also able to cross-reference the Panorama responses with this data set to get a more complete picture of relationships in the building. Finally, we have created a master spreadsheet document that contains all student and teacher responses. This information has been shared with the CHS administrative team and the CHS counselors to support our daily work with students. These data are a valuable resource and extremely important to our work as we strive to make CHS "a place for everyone."

Finally, it is a bit hard to believe that we are in the midst of fourth quarter and Graduation is just over a month away. For me, this time of year always seems a bit frenetic as we move from one event to another. We hosted an outstanding Prom last week at the Starlight Room of the Chase Park Plaza. The CHS Awards Ceremony will be this Tuesday night. AP exams begin next week with senior week events a few weeks away. It is a busy time but also a really exciting time for many of our students. I hope to see you at one of the festivities soon.



#### **Senior Selected For State Academic Honor**

High School Senior **Katherine De la Paz** of Clayton High School has been selected for the 2023 Missouri Scholars 100, a statewide program that honors 100 of Missouri's top academic students in the graduating class of 2023. Missouri Scholars 100 is a program sponsored by the Missouri Association of Secondary School Principals. Schools nominate candidates for this statewide recognition based primarily on numerous criteria including the student's grade point average and ACT or SAT scores. Each student nominated must first meet the criteria of an "Academic Decathlon," which included ten "events" designed to ensure the

student's academic strength. The student must have a minimum GPA of 3.750, a minimum ACT score of 29, or a minimum SAT score of 1,280, be ranked in the upper ten percent of the class and take high-level courses in Mathematics, Science, and English and Foreign Language. The student must also have excellent attendance, be an exemplary school citizen, and be involved in the school activity program.

Clark Mershon, Executive Director of the principals' association, said, "The Missouri Scholars 100 Program is one of the premier academic recognition programs in the country. It is truly a celebration of learning. Students selected for this program have taken a rigorous course of study and maintained the highest academic standards. The Missouri Association of Secondary School Principals wants to celebrate the achievement and success of these students and their schools." #### **Make Sure Your Contact Info Is Correct**

 The parent/guardian contact information in PowerSchool is the basis for all communication sent to families throughout the school year. This year, that will include secure delivery of report cards and standardized test results. Ensuring that your email and phone numbers are correct in PowerSchool is an essential step towards staying in the loop. Here is a <u>checklist and video</u> that shows you how to access contact information for your student to update it and indicate who in your household should be receiving communication.

- Building our social-emotional learning skills continues to be the District goal. Over the next several weeks, students in Grades 3-12 will participate in several surveys to better understand these concepts and to reflect on how they perceive these skills in themselves. We will be asking your child to reflect on their own mindsets and approaches to learning via an online survey they will be completing at school. The survey process should take approximately 20-25 minutes to complete. The survey content will ask students to self-reflect on school climate and environment, positive/challenging feelings, self efficacy, social awareness, self management, and supportive relationships.
- We are asking that all of our students participate in the surveys, as their responses will provide invaluable insights into their experiences and how we can improve and adapt our district to their needs. The responses to these surveys are confidential. However, at times, some responses may warrant further follow up. If a student doesn't feel like they have enough information to answer a question, they will be able to skip the item altogether. We are partnering with a third-party vendor, Panorama Education, to support us in administering these surveys. If you have any questions about the SEL survey, please don't hesitate to contact your child's counselor or building social worker.

#### Missouri Medicaid Renewals Start April 1st:

- Beginning this Saturday, April 1, 2023, the Family Support Division will be starting annual renewals for MO HealthNet (Missouri Medicaid). What you need to do:
  - First, Update your address if you have moved. This can be done going <u>online</u>, visiting a <u>local resource center</u>, or calling 855-373-4636.
  - Second, watch for a letter in the mail. Renewal letters should come between April 2023-April 2024. You will need to follow the instructions on the letter you receive to complete the process.
- Families that do not update their address & receive/respond to the renewal letter will be
  dropped from Medicaid and will need to re-apply. More information can be found <a href="here">here</a>. If you
